

# **Newspaper Article Segmentation — The Pros and Cons**

In the last newsletter, I introduced you to Veridian, and included an interview that I conducted with Stefan Boddie, the CEO of the company behind Veridian Software. Just to repeat: **Veridian** is the name of the software and service package created by **DL Consulting**, a firm headquartered in Hamilton, New Zealand.

The Veridian software package has two unique features that are not commonly provided by digital newspaper "vendors". The first, Article Segmentation, is discussed below. In short, the smallest unit that is created and saved into the digitized newspaper collection is a newspaper article on the page, rather than the entire page. But rather than me trying to explain it, Veridian has given me permission to reprint their discussion of this interesting feature.

When digitizing newspapers it is possible to identify, segment, and categorize individual newspaper articles as they appear on the page. Deciding whether to perform this "article segmentation" process is one of the key decisions when planning a newspaper digitization project.

As discussed in other articles on our site, we strongly recommend using the METS/ALTO format/standard when digitizing newspapers.

METS/ALTO supports both digitized newspapers without article segmentation (sometimes called "page level" METS/ALTO) and those with article segmentation (sometimes called "article level" METS/ALTO). Likewise our Veridian discovery and delivery platform supports both types of METS/ALTO data. Some projects even mix the two types of data in the same collection, on the same site.

#### The advantages of article segmentation

Article segmentation identifies newspaper articles within each digitized page. With this type of METS/ALTO data the smallest component is a newspaper article, as opposed to a newspaper page.

When a user searches a collection at the article level they retrieve a list of articles matching their search terms, as opposed to a list of matching pages. That makes search results much more useful to users — for example, headlines and bylines and other article-level metadata may be displayed in search results.

With this type of article-level data each article can also be categorized. For example, articles can be specified as "advertisements", or "illustrations", or "family notices". Those categories allow for much richer search options — for example, users can restrict their searches to just family notices, or can exclude advertisements from their search results.

Article-level data also allows individual articles to be identified and highlighted when viewing a newspaper using Veridian's discovery and delivery platform. That has a number of benefits, including allowing articles to be "clipped out" from the original page image, for saving or printing.

#### The disadvantage of article segmentation

#### Cost!

All the advantages listed above unfortunately come at a price. There are some solid software products available for automatically identifying articles on digitized newspaper pages, but those systems still need considerable input from human operators in order to produce high quality output.

The result is that the article segmentation process takes a lot of time, which adds significantly to the per-page digitization cost. Producing METS/ALTO data with article segmentation may cost \$0.80 or more per newspaper page, which is two to five times more than producing METS/ALTO without article segmentation.



## The Future of Obituaries

The methods of preparing and publishing obituaries are changing quickly. A simplistic view might be—"What's the Big Deal?" Instead of paper, they are now online. I'm not so sure there is a simple answer. Here are my thoughts:

## **Publishing Newspaper Obituaries and Online Newspaper Obituaries**

Physical newspaper obituaries are costly. So besides the burial and funeral expenses, a newspaper obituary just adds to the expense.

From National Cremation:

"An average obituary can easily be \$200.00-500.00. Costs vary by publication. Newspapers charge by the line and can average \$450 for a complete obituary. The average obituary cost begins at \$200.00 and increases due to the amount of content, including a photograph and the length of the obituary."

From Legacy.com:

A recent study they performed shows that most people seeking to publish a newspaper obituary have no clue how much they cost. See the results of their study – **Obituaries: The Gap Between Newspaper Pricing Trends & Consumer Expectations**

The good news about publishing an obituary via an online newspaper is that despite the cost, it can be inexpensive enough that one can author a longer obituary than you might if it was intended for an obituary that would actually be published in the physical newspaper.

## So, as genealogy researchers, where does that leave us in the future in order to find Obituaries?

There will still be published newspaper obituaries, whether in a physical newspaper and/or in the online version of their newspaper.

#### Where Can I Find Published Newspaper Obituaries?

The old-fashioned way – the primary methods we use now, such as searching old newspapers, or specialty obituary web pages, or obituary indexes, often prepared by libraries and genealogical societies. For free resources, check out the **Newspaper Links** Page, and the **Obituaries** Page on this website.

#### Where Can I Find Online Obituaries?

This is where it gets interesting. They are all over the place. Here are the options:

- Individual online newspaper websites
- Funeral Home websites
- Free aggregators like Legacy.com, who on their website state that they partner with 1,500 newspaper websites, and 3,500 funeral homes. There are quite a few aggregators.
- Individual "remembrance" and other online obituary sites where one can post a recently deceased relative. I have personally
  made use of one of these. These are typically not aggregated.
- Schlock sites who gather up obituaries from a bunch of sources and publish them, but they really are a bait and switch because they are simply trying to get you to click on their ads. And their web pages are incredibly ugly and busy and full of ads.
- Aggregators who charge a few bucks for a one time or subscription access to their posted obituaries.

So, in the future, where do we find all these online obituaries? The answer seems to be incredibly easy, and the future seems to be bright.

#### To find an online obituary or memorial, use Google (or your favorite search engine). It works!

I have personally used this technique successfully for recently departed relatives and friends. There is a caveat of course—what happens 30 years from now? These online companies need to stay in business. But what if they don't? There is always the Wayback Machine I guess.

See? Not so easy.

# 20 Things You Can Find in Church Records to Help Find Your Ancestors

Prior to the recording of civil records and even now, Church Records have become a necessary, and valuable category of collections that should be researched. They provide information that often cannot be found anywhere else. Baptisms, marriages, and funerals are commonly thought of when we discuss church records, but there is so much more. For example, I found the death date of one of my relatives in Berlin, Germany via a Church Newsletter!

Here is a list of the valuable information contained in Church Records and why you should be researching them:

- <u>Baptisms and Christenings</u> Names of godparents and witnesses are often included as well as the names of the
  child and parents. parish where the family is residing, legitimacy of the child, etc. These additional names may provide relationship clues
- <u>Marriages</u> church weddings are documented. In more modern times, witnesses are required in order to civilly record the marriage, and may be required in some religions.
- Deaths and Funerals If the funeral "ceremony" is conducted in a church, it is generally recorded
- <u>Burials</u> if it is a church-affiliated cemetery, the burial information will be recorded in the church's records.
- Confirmations, Bar/Bat Mitzvahs these are generally recorded by the church or synagogue
- Membership Lists Members and congregants are kept in membership lists. These are quite useful to compare
  year to year, as an absence from the list may indicate that a member may have moved their residence, passed on, or
  joined another church.
- Admissions of New Members will be recorded in the membership list and/or church newsletter. The date of entry
  may indicate when someone moved to a new location
- <u>Transfers of Memberships Out of the Church</u> there even may be a formal document indicating that the member leaves in good standing with the church
- <u>Letters of Introduction</u> a current church official might write to assist the member and family in joining a new church within the denomination, but in a different area
- <u>Disciplinary Actions Against Members</u> might be recorded in the Church Minutes
- <u>Dismissals</u> for whatever reason, an individual or family may be dismissed from the church. These would be recorded.
- <u>Church Minutes</u> the church officials often would conduct meetings to discuss the administrative and business side
  of the church, and the meetings would be recorded in official minutes of the meetings
- <u>Church Directories</u> similar to membership lists, these might include residence information and other contact information of the church clergy and all members.
- <u>Sunday School Lists</u> lists of children who attend Sunday School, as well as the teacher's name.
- <u>Church Newsletters</u> regularly published documents that discuss events of the church, new members, transferring members, birthdays, anniversaries, births, marriages, and deaths of members
- <u>Clergy Admissions and Dismissals</u> might be included in the church minutes; also, may be formal documents from
  the higher ups in the church organizational structure for a larger area
- <u>Church Newspapers and Magazines</u> a more recent phenomenon; essentially another way, similar to a newsletter, to communicate between the church and congregants and members
- <u>Family Relationships</u> may be specifically documented in membership lists, or can be determined from people
  attending baptisms, weddings, or funerals.
- <u>Church Cemetery Records</u> includes name of deceased, date of death, burial date and place, sometimes age and
  cause of death.
- <u>Newspaper Obituaries and Other Articles</u> Clues to church membership can be found in historical newspaper articles such as obituaries. Also, upcoming and past church events will be documented in newspapers.


