

Veridian's Top Ten Tips for Newspaper Digitization Projects



- 1. Consider the entire project and all its steps from the outset and talk to all your proposed vendors/suppliers early in the planning process.
- 2. Sometimes the decisions you make about the platform the finished collection will reside on may affect the type/format of digital objects you need to produce. If possible, make decisions about hosting platforms and long-term preservation prior to starting on the scanning/digitization process.
- 3. Consider which parts of the project you're able to do yourself and which you might outsource. For example, if the project is not too large you might consider doing the scanning work in-house, if you have suitable equipment. For larger projects though it might make sense to outsource all the scanning and data preparation work.
- 4. Carefully consider how the project fits with (and differs from) your other digitization projects. Is the platform and/or workflow you've used for previous digitization projects suitable for newspapers? Are there better alternatives?
- 5. Get advice from those who have worked on large newspaper digitization projects before. Newspaper projects have unique characteristics and are often more complex than other types of digitization projects. You are likely to get good advice from other institutions that have gone through the process. Following a similar approach/workflow to that you've developed for other types of projects may not always be the best option.
- 6. Produce <u>digital objects</u> in the METS/ALTO format. If done correctly it should not cost more to produce <u>METS/ALTO</u> than something simpler like PDF. See <u>Why choose METS/ALTO?</u> for a full explanation of why this is so important.
- 7. Evaluate your scanning/digitization options carefully. If your newspapers have already been microfilmed it is easier and less expensive to scan from microfilm than from originals. Scanning from microfilm also gives you a larger choice of vendors, since microfilms are much more easily transported than original newspapers. On the flip side, scanning from originals may produce better digital images.
- 8. If using different vendors for scanning and OCR, as is often the case for large newspaper projects, or if you're doing the scanning in-house, talk to the people responsible for the OCR process early in the project. If possible, send sample images to the OCR vendor prior to going ahead with large-scale scanning. Filters and image processing algorithms applied after scanning to make images "look nice" can often have a detrimental effect on OCR accuracy.
- 9. Consider the costs and benefits of <u>article segmentation</u>. Many modern newspaper digitization projects now do this, to allow individual newspaper articles to be identified on the page. Article segmentation is generally considered to provide a nicer user experience, but there is additional cost. Typically, you might expect it to cost \$0.20 \$0.50 per page to digitize newspapers without article segmentation, or \$0.70 \$1.00 with it.
- 10. Consider running a pilot project with a small number of newspaper pages, prior to making any final decisions. Many scanning, OCR, and hosting platform vendors (including us at Veridian!) are willing to process a small number of samples and put them online for evaluation, for little or no cost. Doing so allows you to ensure the entire process works as expected before you commit to it.






Are You Ready for the 1950 Census?

A Perfect Example Why You Should Search for Photos Online



In the last week, I completed an update to the Free Online Photo Archives and Collections for all the states in the U.S. and all the provinces in Canada:

4,105 Free Online Historical Photo Archives from the U.S. 495 Free Online Historical Photo Archives from Canada

As genealogy researchers, we aspire to see what our ancestors looked like – what they wore, their surroundings, where they lived, etc. Sometimes the names of the individuals are cited in these photo archives and sometimes not. So as another benefit we may find additional ancestors with the same surnames, even though the photo itself may not indicate the familial relationship.

But isn't that like trying to find a needle in a haystack, you might ask. Yes, it surely can be. Personally, I have found only 3 photos of my relatives in photo archives.

But I want to share with you the text of an email that I received from one of my readers and why it may be worth your while to search these archives for your ancestors.

".... It is so hard not to get into some of the full story of my research but I do want to tell you one finding that was astounding and it affirms the potential for spending time looking at historical photos.

Over time I was able to determine when and why my great-great-grandfather and his son moved to Austin TX in 1867. That made me curious about the city of Austin in the late 1800's so I went to the Lawrence T. Jones III Texas photography collection held by SMU. I was even able to specify Austin in my search. As I skimmed through the thumbnails, I would enlarge photos that seemed interesting. One of the photos was a six man band and I zoomed in to get a better look. Lo and behold, someone had written the names of the 6 men in the photo and one of the guys in the middle was Leslie Price, my great-grandfather! The collection also included a jpg of the back of the photo which was dated December 2, 1867, Austin Texas! It was the find of a lifetime, totally unexpected, and discovered simply by looking through the collection. Leslie was 20 years old. He and his father, William B Price, had just moved to Austin because a yellow fever epidemic had killed WB's wife and third child, Clay, and nearly wiped out La Grange Texas"

This was from Clay Price III, and I really appreciate his positive feedback and hopefully, it will inspire you to search these old photo archives as well, so that you can find something astounding, just like Mr. Price.



11 Ways That Historical Photos Provide Clues About Our Ancestors

- <u>Professional Photographer</u> If a professional photographer took the photos, does his name and location or the name of the studio give us a clue as to the ancestor's residence?
- <u>Type of Photo</u> Daguerreotype? Tintype? Cabinet card? Can provide you with timing information.
- Photo Frame was it in a cardboard frame that often had the photographer's name and city or address?
- <u>Clothing</u> the clothing that was worn can give us great clues as to the date of the photograph and therefore clues for our research.
- Hair Style clues about the timing of the photo.
- Furniture and Props in a professional photograph more timing clues.
- <u>Surrounding information</u> such as landscape, signs, furniture, machinery, automobiles, and even technology, such as radios and televisions. This can give you dating clues as well as the location of the photo; in some cases their residence location or where they went on vacation.
- House Architecture many photos were taken on the outside of a home. I even have
 many photos where the house number is included. The architecture of the home can provide some clues as to its location.
- <u>Gravestone Photo</u> terrific birth and death date information (although not always accurate) and who the person is buried next to or near can provide additional clues.
- Writing on the back many times the name(s) of the folks in the photo were written on the back. But since you don't know who wrote the names or when they were written, caution should be taken as to their accuracy.
- <u>Postcards</u> in the first few decades of the 20th century, special postcards with a photo on the back were mailed. Obviously, the writing in the corresponding part of the card can provide great clues.

For the best information regarding dating an old photograph – it would be very helpful to visit Maureen Taylor's <u>Photo Detective</u> website. And in the U.K., <u>Jayne Shrimpton</u>. Both have numerous articles and books pertinent to photo analysis.



What You Can Find by Researching Alumni Records

Maybe it's just me, but I have never heard anyone write or talk about using Alumni Records in their genealogy research. I use them personally, and have discovered mountains of information in these gems.

I contend that alumni records are part directories, part newspapers and magazines, part biographies, part obituaries, part yearbooks, part vital records, etc. You get the idea. If you are seeking genealogy clues, these "records' are full of them. All of the information is derivative, but it can provide leads for you to search for original documents. And if you are documenting a person's family story, well, there's a ton of that kind of information too.

Here's an example of a page from an Alumni Bulletin

1918

The Margaret Bailey Speer Library and Classroom Building at the Shipley School was dedicated in October. An oil painting of Margaret was presented to the school at that time. She was headmistress of Shipley from 1944-1965.


