



### Find School Yearbooks Online

School yearbooks, immortalize how we looked and what we did in high school or college. Whether we looked goofy or cool, that photo is there forever. And they document what clubs, sports, or other activities we were involved in. And for our ancestors, too! There is a significant amount of genealogy information that can be found in school yearbooks. For a detailed list of information that you can find in old yearbooks, go to <a href="Menager Personal School">Genealogy in Yearbooks</a>. Below is a list of the major providers of online school yearbooks.

Ancestry.com has a nice school yearbook collection to search for. I would encourage you to check out the schools and years available in the "Browse This Collection" section on the right side of the page in order to look for a specific yearbook. Ancestry requires a subscription. They have over 500,000 yearbooks – that's yearbooks, not schools.

My Heritage has a huge collection of yearbooks that can be searched. They have over 250,000 yearbooks, again yearbooks, not schools. They also have the Alumni Lists originally provided by Distant Cousin. Some are transcribed and some are scanned page images. My Heritage requires a subscription. WorldVitalRecords (now owned by My Heritage); school yearbooks are included as well.

The last "big player" is <u>Classmates.com</u> which has a collection of over 470,000 yearbooks where a reprint can be purchased. I will leave it up to you to figure out how to save an image or two. It can be accomplished. You can view the yearbooks by browsing. You do not need to have a subscription, but you are limited as to how many pages you can view.

The Ancestor Hunt has yearbook links from 15,300 schools in the U.S. and Canada. It is free.

The <u>Internet Archive</u> has over 74,000 results if you search for the keyword "yearbooks". Definitely worth searching if you know the school or association. By and large, the Internet Archive yearbooks are included in The Ancestor Hunt's list of links.

**E-Yearbook.com** has a sizable collection available by subscription. You can view it by registering. They don't advertise the number of yearbooks, but it is sizable. They also have a nice collection of Military Yearbooks and Navy Cruise books.

<u>Skalooza</u> is interesting. It has a good number of yearbooks available; it is easy to register, and the interface is easy to use. Quite honestly, I have had difficulty finding things on this site.

<u>Old Yearbooks</u> collection was a combination of scanned and transcribed. It is a combination of class lists, random class pictures, and a list of links, many of which are in Classmates. It is now defunct.

Dead Fred has a collection of photos from old yearbooks that you might want to browse.

<u>Don's List</u> has a nice collection of old yearbooks and alumni association directories, many from Pittsburgh and Pennsylvania. There are over 100 schools.

**Ebay** and **Amazon** have a lot of old yearbooks for sale.

<u>GenealogyToday</u> has over 1.700 yearbooks and is a subscription-only service. Recent attempts at accessing this site have been unsuccessful.

There are a few link-only sites, such as <u>Cyndi's List</u>, <u>Linkpendium</u>, and <u>Access Genealogy</u> The number of links is in the low hundreds, although it is difficult to know Linkpendium's.

<u>Google Books</u> has a wide variety of yearbooks available. Many are from an association and are not related to schools. Worth a search. Unfortunately. most are not viewable.

<u>Hathitrust</u> has a couple of hundred full-view school yearbooks. Usually, there are only a couple of years available, and many are in the early 1900s.



# 8 Reasons You Can't Find Squat About Your Ancestors Online

Whether you search online, or offline at libraries, courthouses, or archives, many times our ancestors can be elusive.

Sometimes they just cannot be found. Whether it be a birth date, census entry, or death date – or anything else of interest to us – we just can't seem to "score."

There are lots of reasons why we aren't successful, but many are because of our own limitations – and especially because we are just too limited in our thinking, and sometimes either inexperienced, or unwilling to try new things.

Below are just a few reasons why we can't find our ancestors online:


- They aren't there! Yes this is a possibility. I have a great great aunt, Carrie Marks, who shows up only in one record the 1880 U.S. Census. She is documented as the daughter of Louis and Caroline Marks, aged 11, born in California. One would think that at age 11, she would have showed up in the 1870 census at age 1, right? Nope she is not there with the family. Had she not been born yet and the age 11 reference in 1880 was wrong? Was she in a hospital at the time of the census? Unfortunately, there is no 1890 census to help and by that time she could have married and changed her name. Even more worrisome is that since her mother's name was also Carrie maybe it was a census taker error. Maybe she didn't exist at all. Then again, maybe I just haven't found her yet.
- <u>Have you expanded your search?</u> Just searching one or two online sources, such as Ancestry.com or FamilySearch just isn't enough. Yes these are huge resources, but just as everything isn't online, all the online stuff isn't in their collections either. There are tons of other resources. Thousands of online collections not named Ancestry or FamilySearch.
- <u>Do you do only exact searches?</u> People who write down others names often write them wrong. And then if there is an index created, they can be mis-transcribed or mis-typed. There are very few if any documents available online that were written by the ancestor themselves. They are generally recorded by someone else from first or second hand (or worse) information. So you need to be creative with your name searching by deliberately searching for names misspelled or using wildcard searches. Yes I said deliberately misspell search terms. You will be surprised at what you will find.
- <u>Do you combine searches and omit surnames</u>? For example if you can't find the surname in a collection do you search for the husband's first name and the wife's first name also, in a specific geographic area? As an example, since their surname was often mangled, I often searched for husband "Ben" and wife "Jennie" (with a blank surname) in California because that is where they lived. This may have given me quite a few folks who didn't have the correct surname but all I needed was one! The right one!
- Have you looked beyond document collections? Sure census records are popular, and draft cards and naturalization, land and immigration records too. But how about newspapers? I have found new names of extended family members stated in newspaper obituaries and other articles just as much as finding a family together in a census. Check out the <a href="Newspapers">Newspapers</a> page on this site for much more information regarding searching newspapers. They are a very underrated resource for you to find stuff. Besides you might find out that your great great uncle was an ax murderer! Exciting!
- <u>Are you aggressive</u>? Or do you just give up too easy? Sitting around waiting for shaky leaves or smart matches? Have you uploaded your tree to FamilySearch, WikiTree, Ancestry, MyHeritage,etc.? Then are you just waiting around for "cousins" to contact you or the services themselves to shake a leaf on your screen? Ain't gonna cut it. You have to be an aggressive as well as creative researcher. And get out of the house if you can. Get to libraries, archives, courthouses and genealogical societies. There is a ton of material that can be accessed that is not digitized or is only available at the institution in a binder somewhere.
- <u>Do you have a research plan?</u> Or do you just search ad hoc, searching broadly for the same thing again and again? What's the old quote? "The definition of Insanity is doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results." That applies here. Yes collections change and are updated. But gee get yourself a plan. Here's an <u>Example of a Template</u> that Caroline Pointer created for Evernote that you can adopt (with or without Evernote) regarding planning for research. Yes it seems like a lot of work when you'd rather be surfing for ancestors. But it is time well spent and I assure you that a research plan will make the difference between finding or not finding some ancestors. Guaranteed!
- They aren't there Part 2 Really. They aren't there. Nobody wrote stuff down back then. Records weren't kept of births in many countries or local villages and towns. There were no marriage certificates. Gravestones have been buried due to wars and such over time. Babies weren't born in hospitals and there were no mortuaries. Not every family had a Bible that they recorded information in. Men didn't carry around a draft card and there was no Social Security.

So that's it for now. A few reasons why you haven't found some folks. But you can't give up – with a few exceptions – ancestors who have lived any time in the last 200 years or so should be able to be found somewhere – and you are just the person to find them. Right?

All you need to do is PLAN, BE AGGRESSIVE, THINK OUTSIDE THE BOX, and BE PERSISTENT.

# First Batch of Massachusetts Newspapers Now Available





# **Bitonal vs Grayscale Newspaper Scanning**

For years I have been obsessed with newspaper research, especially online. My personal genealogy research has centered around discovering the stories of my ancestors lives, which would not have been possible without newspaper stories.

When searching old newspapers one discovers rather quickly, that the quality of the original newsprint and the quality of the scan is paramount in not only the searchability of a page, but also the quality of the resultant image.

This brings us to today's topic—bitonal versus grayscale newspaper scanning. This article is provided by Advantage Archives, and it is highly suggested that you read and understand the difference. It may explain why you can't sometimes find newspaper articles, or why images often don't look very good after they are scanned.

#### From Advantage Archives:

The questions can range from technical to legal to philosophical, but the most common question in nearly every one of these discussions remains:

Should newspapers be scanned in bitonal or grayscale?

- Bi-tonal Scanning process that uses black or white (bi-tonal) as the two-tone values for each pixel.
- Grayscale Scanning process that uses 256 (Gray) tones as the value for each pixel.

Then, before we answer the question of "bitonal or grayscale?", we must first ask another question:

What is the goal of this project, and what is the best approach for these images to meet that goal?

If the goal of the project is to provide a photorealistic representation of the page, grayscale is a more accurate fit for the project. If the size of each file image does not matter and the client has time/server space to index each file, grayscale may be the best bet. If the project requires images to meet library of congress standards for imaging grayscale may be the best fit. However this quality comes at a cost both in terms of production, and in maintaining the collection.

Depending on how many images are to be included in the archive,, simply due to the file size of grayscale images may not possible without investing significant capital into hardware and software.



However, If the goal of the digitization project is to develop a fully key word searchable database with a high return rate on keywords, a browse-able index, and, reduced load times for the end user, and at a per image cost that allows for a greater volume of images can be made accessible.... then bitonal may be the best fit.

Bitonal images require almost half the server storage space of grayscale images and provides a more satisfying user experience, as both search and image load times are significantly shorter than the same newspaper page represented in a grayscale format. Most importantly, Scanning a newspaper page bitonially, creates a very clean, very high quality "text first" approach to image capture due to the elimination of "background noise" found in the inexpensive paper stock of newspapers.

At Advantage Archives, we view digitization as an important part of the preservation process, supplementing microfilm as a more practical method for providing access, outreach and education.

Our position is that a digital copy of a newspaper does not replace the microfilm in terms of preservation, but it is a valuable resource to compliment the microfilm with advantages in ease of use and ability to search terms.

Typically we find our partners are interested in striking a balance between quantity, quality and budget. More specifically, the best balance of quality and quantity that can stretch the budget available for a project. If any one of these three factors is given more priority than the other two, decisions must be made as where to make concessions.



# **Bitonal vs Grayscale Newspaper Scanning**



The photorealistic quality of a greyscale newspaper page, comes at a premium cost, therefore the number of images (volume) will be limited by available budget.

Many of the libraries and historical societies we work with already rely on grants for important scanning projects. Price is a factor and that is why we take this into consideration along with the quality of the product.

The Advantage Companies solution is budget friendly to our partners and allows for entire collections to be done effectively and affordably.

For our digital archives, we recommend and encourage our partners to use bi-tonal scanning which produces quality results for printed text on newspapers at a price that isn't cost prohibitive. Bi-tonal scanning also keeps the file sizes smaller and the search times shorter than other methods. We find Bi-tonal to be our most commonly used method of scanning, but each project is different and can require a variation of different scanning methods to produce the best results.

Content is key and we consider the most important aspect of scanning to be capturing the words on the page. That's why we don't have a "one size fits all" solution. Grayscale has a place in our arsenal, and we find it invaluable in some situations in which bitonal scanning simply is not the best choice, For instance, Greyscale can produce much better results in handwritten or older, damaged documents. With the 256 tones available, Grayscale is able to display finer details than bi-tonal.



We also receive questions from our clients who are interested in following the technical guidelines set forth by the Library of Congress for their National Digital Newspaper Program.

NDNP technical specifications require a 400 dpi 8-bit grayscale archival image, production image, printable image and structural metadata to the standards of the Library of Congress.

We find that the costs associated with NDNP type projects to be prohibitive, and counterproductive when considered by smaller institutions. It greatly limits the amount of content a library can make available to its community. To put it into perspective, for every newspaper page digitized to NDNP standards, a local library could make nearly 13 pages available to the community using a more sot effective solution like bitonal.

In other words, the to digitize a single 100' roll of microfilm (lets use 900 images as an example) to NDNP standards, would cost more than 10,000 images using the methods employed by Advantage and our over 500 library partners.

We work to keep the digitization project metrics for our clients in balance at all times: Keeping costs as low as possible and quality as high as possible that allow for as much volume as possible to maximize the budget allocated to the project.

Our methods, business model, and driving mission all converge on the singular theme: Ensure the content is preserved for the future and accessible today.

The easiest way to access a particular state's or province's list of collections and categories is via the **BY LOCATION** page.



### **Place Finders**

Do you often find yourself wanting or needing to know what county a city is located in or what places might be found in a specific county?

You could do a Google search but what if you had a handy list that included a list of all the cities, other places, and ghost towns that identified their corresponding county along with a list of the counties in a state that listed all of the places in that county?

What is a place? Besides cities and towns, you will find that the names of other places may vary from state to state. Most states have Census Designated Places, Unincorporated communities, Indian Reservations, and ghost towns. Other places may be known as villages, hamlets, historic districts, townships, boroughs, municipalities, and more.

Each state has a list of all the places in the state and their corresponding county. Each place has a link to a page that includes information about that place. The page may include geographical information, historical information, current information about the place and its surroundings, and much more.

Included also for each state, is a Downloadable PDF with two lists:

- A list of places and their corresponding county
- A list of counties with the places that are in that county


