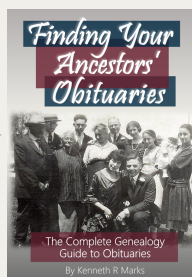

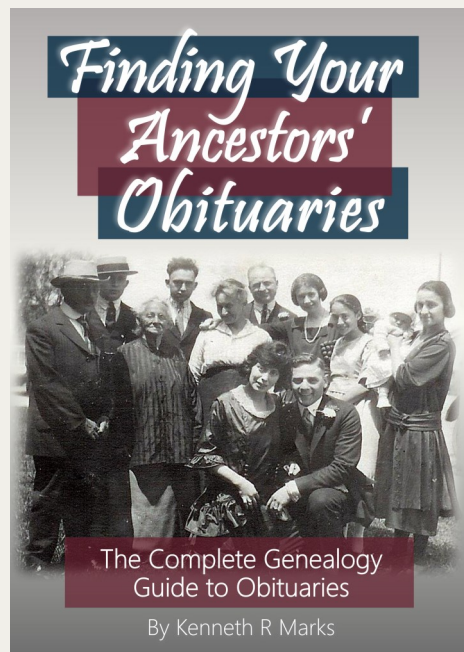

Reclaim the Records is a non-profit organization that strives to obtain genealogical record collections that “ought to be” in the public domain but are restricted by government organizations. They file FOIA and Open Data requests to obtain the records and if that fails to succeed, they go to court.

Once records are obtained, the organization digitizes the records and makes them available on repositories such as the Internet Archive for public use by genealogy researchers and anyone else who has an interest.

[Free Online Genealogy Website of the Day – Hathitrust](#)



HathiTrust began in 2008 as a consortium of 12 Mid-West universities that embody the Committee on Institutional Cooperation, and 11 universities from the University of California system. In essence, the goal was to create a digital repository of scholarly material and books. Copyright and other factors determine the availability of researchers to view documents in the repository. Currently, there are over 17 million volumes in the database. 38% of the content is in the public domain.

Although certainly different in content, database software, and user interface, HathiTrust is similar in concept to Google Books, Internet Archive, and the FamilySearch Digital Library in that they all are digital repositories of book and document content.

HathiTrust is certainly worth a genealogist's time to research. There is a variety of pertinent content that this researcher has discovered. Examples of the most numerous include college yearbooks, city directories, and alumni and school records. Where HathiTrust really shines is in the area of local history books that have been digitized.

You can search the HathiTrust Catalog entries or perform a full-text search. Filtering of results can include Subject, Author, Language, Place of Publication, Date of Publication, Original Format, and Original Location.

The USGenWeb Archives, in my opinion, is one of the top 5 free genealogy websites. Its pages are almost all the same, so the user experience is excellent. There are state websites, further divided into county websites. Each county website presents links to collections and records by category. The naming conventions are universal, and it is very easy to navigate.

From the USGenWeb Archives website: *"In June 1996, the USGenWeb Digital Library (USGenWeb Archives) was developed to present actual transcriptions of public domain records on the Internet. This huge undertaking is the cooperative effort of volunteers who either have electronically formatted files on census records, marriage bonds, wills, and other public documents or are willing to transcribe this information to contribute."*

New Horizons Genealogy is a site with links for every state in the US in various genealogy categories. It specializes in New England and New York Colonial American Ancestry.

From their website: *“New Horizons Genealogy specializes in New England and New York Colonial American Genealogy, Ancestry, and Family History. Our record collections include Vital records, Arnold Collection of Rhode Island Vital Records, Barbour Collection of Connecticut Vital Records, Colonial and State Census records, Federal and State Census Mortality Schedules, Cemetery records, 1840 Census of Pensioners and Revolutionary War Soldiers Buried in New York State. We also include links to other quality genealogy records to help make these collections as complete as possible”*

The “I Dream of Genealogy” website is not very well known, but it has a set of its own collections and links to other collections. It started in 1998.

From the website: *“Here you will find free online genealogy databases, compiled family histories, vital record resources, famous and celebrity family trees, lost and found family heirlooms, genealogy search, and you can submit your own family records to the free databases.”*

You can also search over 60,000 free genealogy databases – marriage records, cemeteries, vital records from the United States, Canada, Ireland, Europe, and Australia, just to name a few.”

The Genealogy Resources section is the meat of the site. Generally, it is broken down by genealogical category and then by location. For the U.S., that would be the state, and then the county. There are some international collections on the site as well.

Google has several search engines and databases that are very useful for genealogy researchers. Here is an overview of some of these databases and functions.

Google Books has a seemingly never-ending supply of digitized books. And there is an ample number of old books that can be used in your genealogy research. Generally, there are two types of entries: books that are digitized and full text of the entire book is available online, and books where only partial sections or pages are available, and only snippets of your resultant search results provide useful information.

Google Patents presents a search engine to find old patents from around the world. Personally, I found that five of my ancestors held patents, much to my surprise, and several of them were from the 1800s!

Google Cache provides the ability to see a previous version of a web page. This is particularly useful when you get a 404 Error or a "File Not Found" page when going to a website. Just enter "cache:" in front (do not enter the quotes) of the desired webpage URL, and it will take you to a previous version of the page.

Google Scholar provides a simple way to broadly search for scholarly literature. From one place, you can search across many disciplines and sources: articles, theses, books, abstracts, and court opinions, from academic publishers, professional societies, online repositories, universities, and other web sites.

Google Images has over 28 billion images in its database. Similar search functions as in generic Google Search are available. There also is a reverse image search. This is particularly useful for genealogists as it may find other researchers who have the same or similar photo as that of your ancestor that you are performing the reverse image search for or even an image base somewhere with pertinent photos. This can also be used to find larger or better quality versions of the same image.

Google Maps and **Google Earth** are particularly useful for genealogists as we can see visually what a house, business, or other property looks like. Also creating custom maps of our ancestors' residences can also provide us with genealogical clues.

Google Translate is very useful when attempting to convert written documents, letters, or other material from the language of the "old country" to current language. There are over 100 languages available.

Google Alerts is an excellent resource for genealogy researchers. It is like having a constant search running all the time. It won't necessarily search inside databases or their records, but if a mention of a person, surname, or whatever else you set the Alert up for occurs in a new resource or news article, you will be sent an email. It can be your secret weapon!

Google News Archive provides search and browsing capabilities for over 2,300 newspaper titles, primarily from the U.S. and Canada. It is no longer updated as of several years ago. The search capability can be hit and miss for older newspapers published prior to 1970, but it is worth the effort.

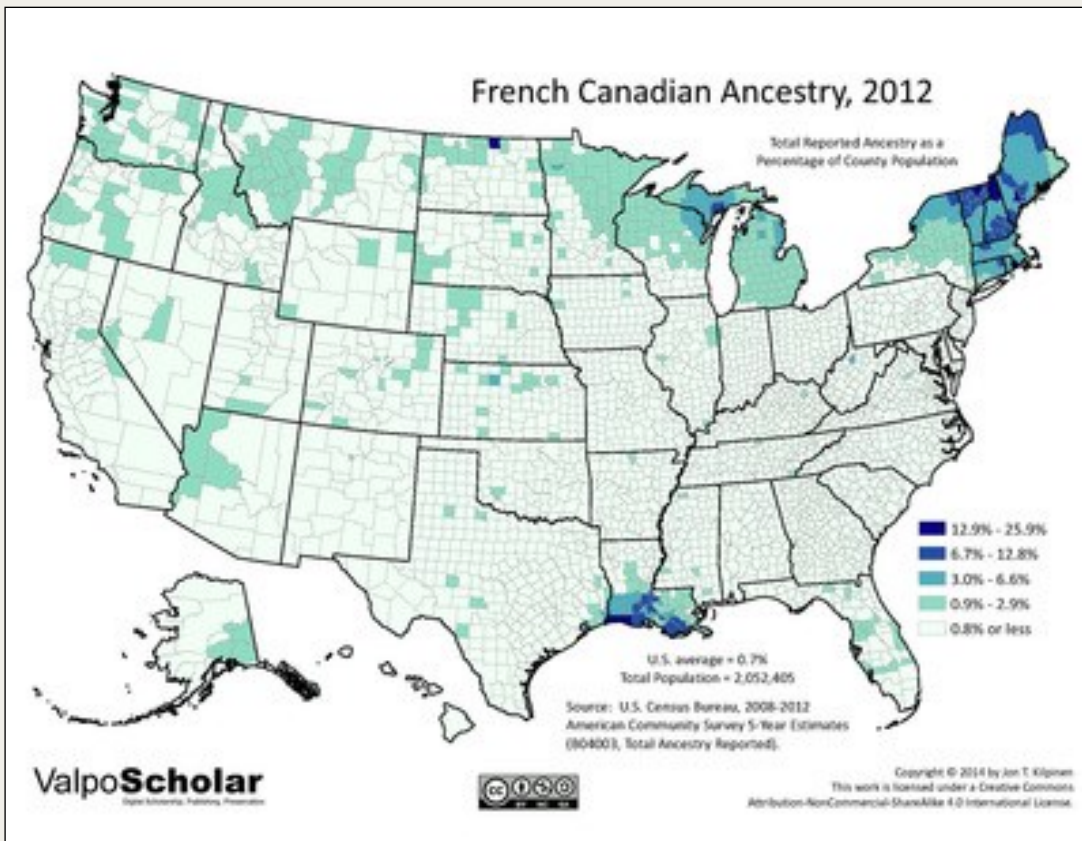
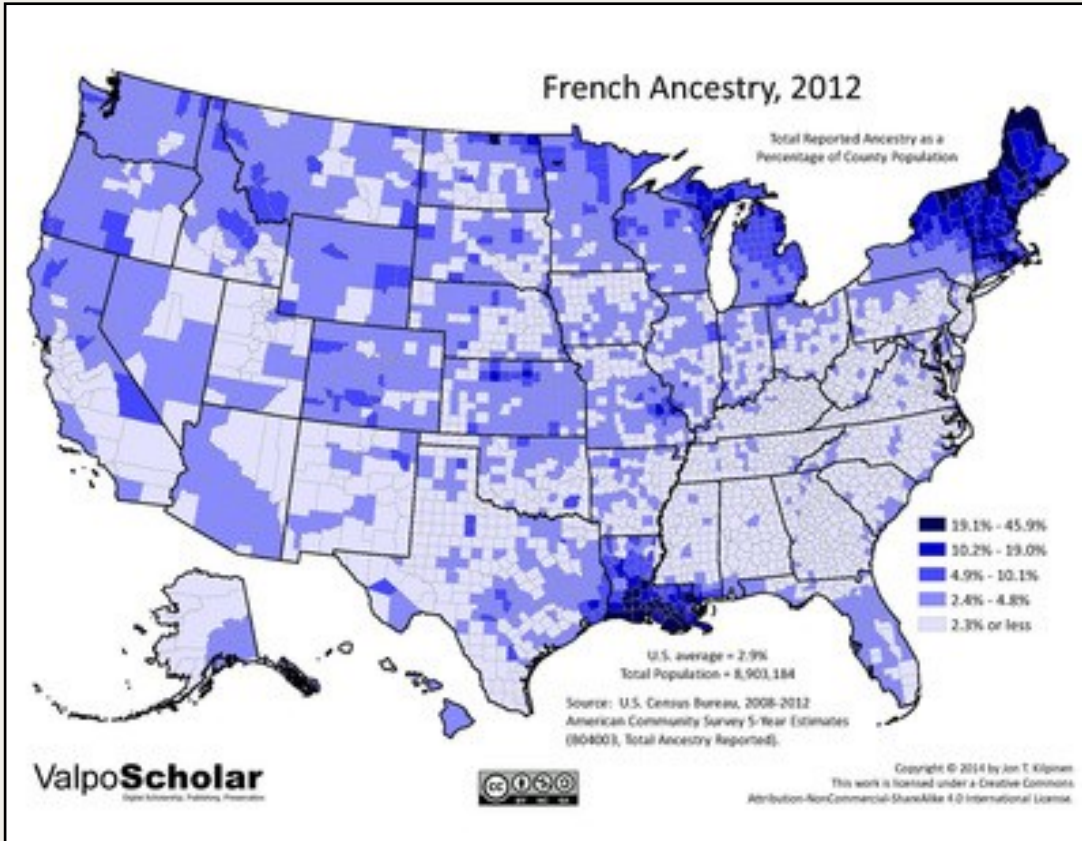

Genealogy Information in Yearbooks

People think yearbooks from high school or college are just for fun. And they are fun! They provide you with a ton of story-like information about your ancestor's life. What their interests were, what sports and clubs they participated in, and often some goofy snapshots of them before they became an adult.

But is there useful genealogical information that you can derive from old yearbooks?

Heck, yes. Check out this list of very useful info you can get from them:

Residential Location

The specific address and city are not presented, but typically the school is within 5 to 10 miles from their actual residence. Some smaller area schools may include their residential address. Some colleges may include their city of residence.

Interests

The clubs and other interests may provide a clue as to their future occupation, for example, 4-H Club. Were they in ROTC? Maybe this provides a clue as to which future military service they were a part of.

Signatures

Although autographs and the few words that are written may seem silly, there may be mention of what your person may do in the future. And who knows, if their siblings or cousins went to the same school and are also in the yearbook, mention of their relationship may be included. Maybe, just maybe, girlfriends and boyfriends in high school end up being spouses in the future. Don't underestimate the clues that may be in autographs.

Age

You will know the year of the yearbook and based on their class, e.g., senior, sophomore, etc. you can roughly estimate within a year their birth year. Of course, if they skipped a grade or were held back a year, that may make your estimate off a year or so. But again, it is a great clue.

Non-student information

Faculty and other employees are generally included in yearbooks. Maybe your ancestor/relative worked at a school for 30 years. This might provide you with a photo of them for multiple years!

Photos

This is the holy grail of yearbooks. But not only will you get "headshots", but also your ancestor/relative in sports, clubs, and other interesting scenes that help you fill out their life story.

Rural Schools

Might include younger students in a combined school that includes elementary or middle school grades. In the late 1800s and early to middle 1900s, many students didn't stay in school past the 6th or 8th grade.

"FAN" Club

Friends and acquaintances can be determined not just by the appearance of other students in the yearbook, but who autographed your ancestor/relative's yearbook may provide other research targets that might indicate a longer relationship into the adult years. Again, don't underestimate the clues that may be in autographs. They may be invaluable to your research.

Advertisements

May not necessarily provide direct information about your ancestor/relative, but may give you a sense of the community where they went to school.



Genealogy Information in Yearbooks

Nicknames

Generally, via autographs or other notations about your ancestor/relative, nicknames can be critical information to use when searching old newspapers and other genealogy databases. Maybe Richard Johnson was a left-handed baseball player nicknamed "Lefty". In newspapers, he might have been found as "Lefty Johnson"

Middle Names

Middle names are not generally found in yearbooks, but possibly. However, many students "went by" their middle name rather than their first name, so this might be helpful in future genealogy research about the individual.

Maiden Names

You've found the woman; you know what her married name is; and you know where she lived in her high school years. Check out the yearbooks in the area. If you know what she looked like, you might find her in a yearbook. Tedious yes, but a possibility. Maybe she married her high school sweetheart. Check out their yearbook.

Military Service

During World War 1 and World War 2, there might be separate lists in the yearbooks for students who were in the military.

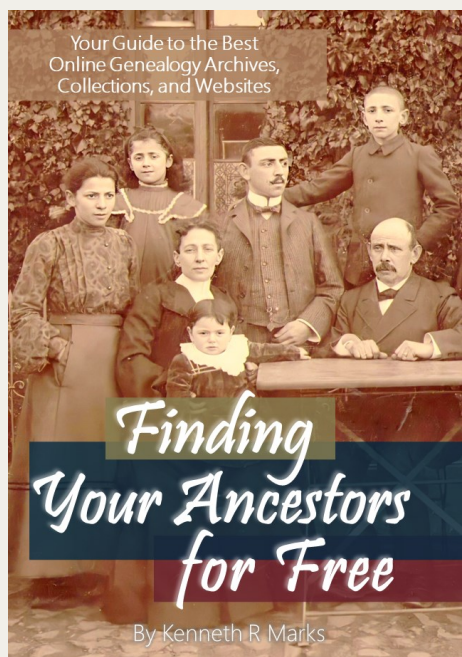

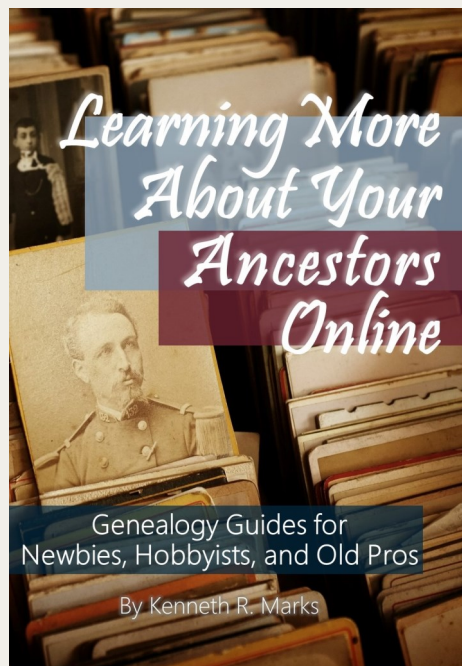

Let's Talk About Copyright: Do The Right Thing

Newspapers especially, play a significant role in genealogy research. Copyright laws dictate what can be digitized and presented to the general public, and what cannot. This article is reprinted with permission from Advantage Archives.



When embarking upon a [digitization](#) project, careful consideration must be given to how you intend to provide access and what you can and cannot do under U.S. Copyright laws. You need to consider whether the publications are subject to copyright, whether you have permission to use the work, and whether the way you plan to use the materials falls within a copyright exception. I will preface this like I always do when the topic of copyright arises: **"I am not a lawyer."** Taking legal advice from me is similar to asking WebMD for a diagnosis....you will want to seek a second opinion.

That being said, **you do not need a lawyer** to tell you that copyright holders have rights regarding their intellectual property. You need to respect those rights and not infringe upon them when you provide access to [digitized newspapers](#) or other materials protected by copyright law.

Remember, **partnerships matter**. Developing a relationship with the right holder and seeking their permission to use any of their works not in the public domain should be explored. This is their property and remains so until their content enters the public domain. It remains theirs to dictate how, when, and where it can be used.

What is copyright?

United States copyright laws apply protection to the intellectual property of a [publisher, individual author, or artist](#).

What is "public domain"?

In discussing newspapers, "Public Domain" refers to a [publisher's](#) works not protected by those intellectual property laws. The public owns these works, and anyone can responsibly use public domain work without obtaining permission, but no one can ever "own it."

It is clearly in the public domain if:

The copyright has expired (before 1927 or more than 95 years from publication)

However, it MIGHT BE in the public domain if:

Although copyright laws are well defined, there is an area of gray between 1924 and 1977. During this period, some publications were printed without notice of copyright or in compliance with the day's copyright laws.

The other way newspaper content has become public domain is if **the copyright owner has failed to comply with copyright renewal rules (1923-1989)**.

If it was published before 1978 and did not have the © copyright symbol printed in the publication, **it could fall within the public domain**. Between 1924 and 1977, many newspapers were published without notice of copyright or did not register with the U.S. Copyright Office. Therefore, you will want to do your due diligence on these titles before [providing free digital access to this content](#).

When Does New Content Enter The Public Domain?

Copyright was "frozen" at 1923 for the last 20 years.

On January 1st, 2019, new content entered the public domain for the first time since 1998, making 1924 content available.

On January 1st, 2020, content from 1925 became public domain, and every year since (and every year going forward), a new year's worth of content is free to use without restriction.

Let's Talk About Copyright: Do The Right Thing (Continued)

Are there copyright exceptions for libraries, archives, or museums?

The answer to this question is a little more complicated. However, it is understood that when it comes to [providing access to digitized content](#), there are exemptions for these institutions IF specific and defined guidelines are followed.

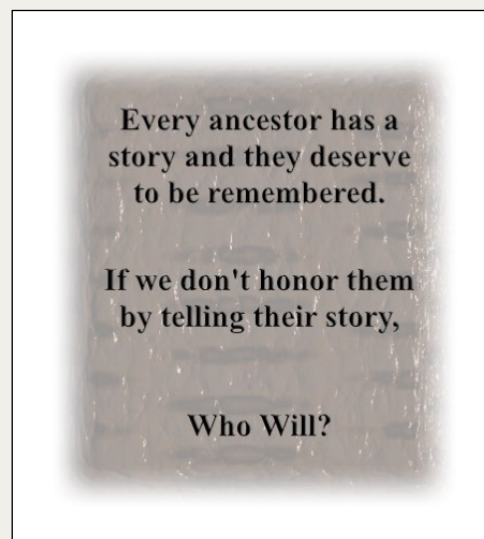
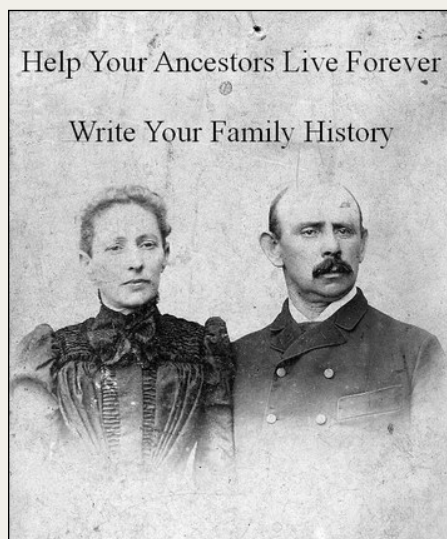
First, these exceptions apply only to [libraries, museums, and archives](#) that are open to the public or to unaffiliated researchers in a specialized field.

Title 17, section 108 of the U.S. Code permits libraries and archives to use copyrighted material in specific ways. These provisions are called "limitations" or "exceptions" because they limit the exclusive rights of copyright owners. In specified circumstances, they exempt libraries, archives, and museums from obtaining permission from copyright holders.

The critical thing to remember about these exemptions is that the digitized content MUST be used in the same manner, method, or intent as the original.

To provide [access to newspaper content](#) that is not clearly residing in the public domain, the qualifying institution MUST ensure that these publications are currently in the library or museum collections. This could either be the [microfilmed](#) copy in your holdings or hard copies of the papers.

The other important thing to understand is that any copy made in [digital format](#) may not be made available to the public in that format outside the library premises. Just like the microfilm in a library's collection, the newspapers not in the public domain must be restricted to use from within your physical location only. In practice, a restricted digital archive will be used in the same "manner, method, or intent" as using the physical materials, essentially becoming a "digital" microfilm reader.

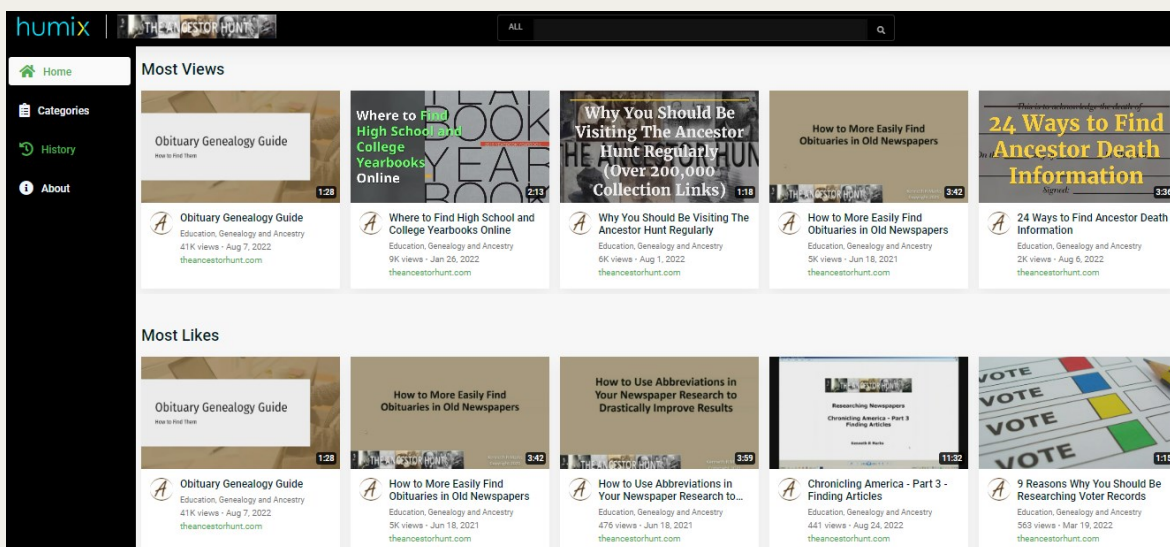

Place Finders

Do you often find yourself wanting or needing to know what county a city is located in or what places might be found in a specific county?

You could do a Google search but what if you had a handy list that included a list of all the cities, other places, and ghost towns that identified their corresponding county along with a list of the counties in a state that listed all of the places in that county?

What is a place? Besides cities and towns, you will find that the names of other places may vary from state to state. Most states have Census Designated Places, Unincorporated communities, Indian Reservations, and ghost towns. Other places may be known as villages, hamlets, historic districts, townships, boroughs, municipalities, and more.

Each state has a list of all the places in the state and their corresponding county. Each place has a link to a page that includes information about that place. The page may include geographical information, historical information, current information about the place and its surroundings, and much more.

Included also for each state, is a Downloadable PDF with two lists:

- A list of places and their corresponding county
- A list of counties with the places that are in that county

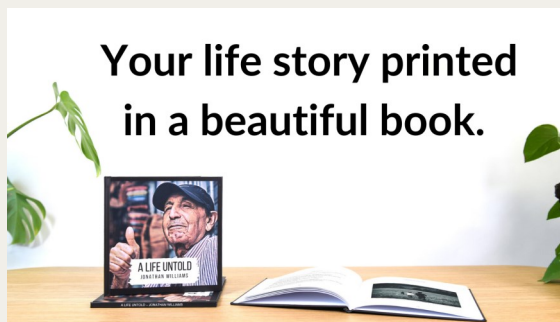
