

Free Ways to Find Patents from Your Inventor Ancestor

I knew that my Dad had several patents, and that his grandfather possibly held one or two. So a few years ago I started searching and found two additional ancestors that had filed for and gotten approved a few more patents. I would suggest that you search these five free databases that have patent documents from all over the world. You just might be surprised!

<u>Google Patents Search</u> – is generally the "go to" website to search for patents. It has over 18 million documents and has patent documents world-wide, not just the U.S. It gets the nod over the US Patent Office because older patents are text-searchable with Google Patents and are not via the USPTO. Google Patents has documents starting from 1790.

Just go to https://patents.google.com/ It is free.

<u>U.S. Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO)</u> – One can search for patents via text for patent documents newer than 1976. But if you have the Patent number, you can get the image online for patents older than 1976. To be more specific for patents prior to 1976, Patents from 1790 through 1975 are searchable only by Issue Date, Patent Number, and Current US Classification.

Just go to https://patft.uspto.gov/netahtml/PTO/search-bool.html It is free.

<u>European Patent Office</u> – Espacenet provides free access to over 130 million patent documents from 1782 to the present. It includes patents from the U.S., as well as world-wide.

Just go to https://worldwide.espacenet.com/ It is free.

The World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO) – Has a service called PATENTSCOPE that provides search of 100 million patent documents including 4.2 million published international patent applications.

Just go to https://www.wipo.int/patentscope/en/ It is free.

<u>LENS</u> – is a scholarly database that serves over <u>225+ million scholarly works</u>, <u>127+ million global patent records</u>, and more than <u>370+ million patent sequences</u>. There are over 136 million Patent Records from 106 jurisdictions around the world.

Just go to https://www.lens.org/lens/search/patent/structured It is free.

Try out one or more of these databases. You might be pleasantly surprised like I was!

Have You Checked Out History Hub?

Have you checked out History Hub (history.gov) to visit their communities and ask questions that could help further your genealogy research?

History Hub is sponsored by the National Archives and was developed by them in 2016 as a community crowdsourced support platform where people can ask questions, get help with research and share their knowledge and information they have. National Archive staff respond to many of the questions with information about resources found at the National Archives and sometimes include information about other resources. Genealogists, citizen archivists, historians, etc. are also welcomed to help answer questions. There are 19 community pages which are listed below. On the community pages you will find an overview, existing questions and answers, a place to ask your question, and links to relevant blog posts.







Do You Elephind?



What is Elephind? It is a search of multiple online newspaper databases, all at once. This ius commonly called a "Federated Search". It is a service provided by DL Consulting of New Zealand, the company behind Veridian Software. The material below is reprinted with permission from DL Consulting.

The goal of <u>Elephind.com</u> is to make it possible to search all the world's online historic newspapers from one place. We aren't there yet, but we are adding more newspapers every day.

With Elephind.com it is now possible for family historians, genealogists, and researchers to search historic digitized newspaper archives from around the globe. Elephind.com is much like Google, Bing, or other search engines but is focused on only historical, digitized newspapers. It enables you to search, for free, across many newspaper sites simultaneously, rather than having to visit each site separately. By clicking on the Elephind.com search result that interests you you'll go directly to the newspaper site which hosts that story.

Many of the smaller newspaper sites are not well known and may be difficult to find with the usual search engines but are searchable from Elephind.com. We're continuing to add more newspapers to Elephind.com, so if at first you can't find what you're looking for, please check back later.

Here is a list of resident individual newspaper collections that make up the Elephind database, as well as some statistics.





Easy Cousin Relationship Chart

Determining a "Cousin" Relationship between two people is quite easy if you have a proper chart. Many of the charts can be confusing. The one below is quite easy. All you have to do is follow 3 steps:

- 1. Determine the common ancestor between two people.
- 2. For the first person, select the common ancestor's relationship to them across the top row.
- 3. For the second person, select the common ancestor's relationship to them down the left column.

Where those two selections intersect is their relationship.



Place Finders

Do you often find yourself wanting or needing to know what county a city is located in or what places might be found in a specific county?

You could do a Google search but what if you had a handy list that included a list of all the cities, other places, and ghost towns that identified their corresponding county along with a list of the counties in a state that listed all of the places in that county?

What is a place? Besides cities and towns, you will find that the names of other places may vary from state to state. Most states have Census Designated Places, Unincorporated communities, Indian Reservations, and ghost towns. Other places may be known as villages, hamlets, historic districts, townships, boroughs, municipalities, and more.

Each state has a list of all the places in the state and their corresponding county. Each place has a link to a page that includes information about that place. The page may include geographical information, historical information, current information about the place and its surroundings, and much more.

Included also for each state, is a Downloadable PDF with two lists: A list of places and their corresponding county, and; A list of counties with the places that are in that county.

Advantage Archives and The Benefits of Digitizing Yearbooks


Yearbooks are one of my very favorite genealogy resources. There is more to these fun documents than meets the eye. But that's a discission for another day. Advantage Archives has permitted me to reprint this article that they published about how they approach digitizing yearbooks, and why a library or other community might want to do so.


Yearbooks are a window into the past of your community. More than any other material, they offer a snapshot of what life was like at a particular time or moment, on a local level. They open the door to a familiar past for individuals diving into genealogical research, or just reminiscing about their high school or college years.

Due to the popularity and value the community places on them, scanning yearbooks and making them available online has become one of the most sought after offerings by alums, libraries, schools, institutions, and organizations of all sizes.

Yearbooks are more than just a record of ambitions, activities, and questionable fashion. They have become a valuable resource for genealogists, local historical preservation societies, media outlets, and community cultural organizations. In addition, a community's yearbooks offer a uniquely personal perspective on the past that other historical records often overlook or fail to capture.

Yearbooks can help researchers understand local and national events from the perspective of the youth at the time. They can also be used to understand the public sentiment on social issues at various times throughout the community's history.





There are many reasons to digitize yearbooks, but we'd like to emphasize just a few:


