Chronicling America – NEH Announces 2023 Awards to 12 States in the National Digital Program

The National Endowment for the Humanities has announced the 2023 grants for the National Digital Newspaper Program to 12 states. The complete details for all the NEH grants can be found in <u>this pdf</u>

Here are the states and their award:

<u>Arkansas</u>

Arkansas State Archives Outright: \$324,095

Project Description: Digitization of 100,000 to 110,000 pages of Arkansas newspapers published from 1819 to the mid-1930s, with a focus on the Arkansas Gazette and on the evolving relationship between the economy and the environment.

California

University of California, Riverside Outright: \$321,382

Project Description: Digitization of a collection of mid-twentieth century African American newspapers from Los Angeles and the Bay Area, as part of the state's participation in the National Digital Newspaper Program (NDNP).

Connecticut

Connecticut State Library Outright: \$259,644

Project Description: Digitization of 100,000 pages of Connecticut newspapers published prior to 1963, as part of the state's continuing participation in the National Digital Newspaper Program (NDNP). This phase would focus on papers from the early nineteenth century, a Polish newspaper, and papers covering Hartford during the 1940s and '50s

<u>Florida</u>

University of Florida Outright: \$275,743

Project Description: The digitization of 100,000 historical and multilingual newspapers from diverse ethnic and religious groups, as well as geographic locations in Florida for participation in the National Digital Newspaper Program (NDNP).

Georgia

University of Georgia Outright: \$302,070

Project Description: Digitization of 100,000 pages of Georgia newspapers published prior to 1963, as part of the state's continuing participation in the National Digital Newspaper Program (NDNP). This phase would focus on papers published during the Jim Crow and early civil rights eras.

Kentucky

University of Kentucky Research Foundation Outright: \$322,526

Project Description: The digitization of 100,000 pages of historical Kentucky newspapers with a focus on African American, emancipationist, Civil War–era, and German-language papers, which would resume the University of Kentucky Libraries' participation in the National Digital Newspaper Program (NDNP)

Maryland

University of Maryland, College Park Outright: \$322,532

Project Description: Digitization of 100,000 pages of Maryland newspapers, published prior to 1963, as part of the state's continuing participation in the National Digital Newspaper Program (NDNP). This phase would focus on papers from the colonial period and early nineteenth century, the Jewish Times, and titles covering Prince George's County in the 1940s and '50s.

Massachusetts

HE AN OESTOR

Boston Public Library Foundation, Inc. Outright: \$152,803

Project Description: Digitization of 100,000 pages of Massachusetts newspapers published prior to 1963, as part of the state's continuing participation in the National Digital Newspaper Program (NDNP). This phase would continue to focus on papers of record in the state, as well as eighteenth-century newspapers.



Chronicling America – NEH Announces 2023 Awards to 12 States in the National Digital Program

<u>Ohio</u>

Ohio Historical Society Outright: \$319,511

Project Description: Digitization of 100,000 pages of Ohio newspapers published prior to 1963, as part of the state's sixth round of participation in the National Digital Newspaper Program (NDNP). This phase would focus on three themes: community building, democracy, and transportation.

Rhode Island

Providence Public Library Outright: \$285,979

Project Description: Digitization of 100,000 pages of Rhode Island newspapers published before 1923, as part of the state's participation in the National Digital Newspaper Program (NDNP).

<u>Texas</u>

University of North Texas Outright: \$203,140

Project Description: Digitization of 100,000 pages of Texas newspapers dating from 1908 to 1945, as part of the state's participation in the National Digital Newspaper Program (NDNP).

Wyoming

University of Wyoming Outright: \$263,100

Project Description: Digitization of 100,000 pages of Wyoming's microfilmed newspapers as part of the state's continuing participation in the National Digital Newspaper Project.

11 Things You Can Find by Researching Alumni Records

Maybe it's just me, but I have never heard anyone write or talk about using Alumni Records in their genealogy research. I use them personally, and have discovered mountains of information in these gems.

I contend that alumni records are part directories, part newspapers and magazines, part biographies, part obituaries, part yearbooks, part vital records, etc. You get the idea. If you are seeking genealogy clues, these "records' are full of them. All of the information is derivative, but it can provide leads for you to search for original documents. And if you are documenting a person's family story, well, there's a ton of that kind of information too.

So what am I including in Alumni Records?

- Alumni directories
- Alumni registers
- Alumni newsletters, bulletins, newspapers, and magazines
- Commencement programs
- Alumni Association records

And what information is available in them?

- Graduation dates and degree(s) received
- Current photos and/or those of their family
- Current address lists
- Where are they now and what are they doing?
- Obituaries and "In Memoriam"
- Marriages
- Children born to the alumnus
- Deaths in their family
- Life achievements and awards
- Interesting stories about the alumnus and their family
- Class reunion memorabilia

The message here is to research these genealogical gold mines. You'll be glad you did!

The By Location Page

The easiest way to access a particular state's or province's list of collections and categories is via the **<u>BY</u> <u>LOCATION</u>** page.

This page has a dropdown for each state or province, with a link to the online collections links for every category available.



Place Finders

Do you often find yourself wanting or needing to know what county a city is located in or what places might be found in a specific county?

You could do a Google search but what if you had a handy list that included a list of all the cities, other places, and ghost towns that identified their corresponding county along with a list of the counties in a state that listed all of the places in that county?

What is a place? Besides cities and towns, you will find that the names of other places may vary from state to state. Most states have Census Designated Places, Unincorporated communities, Indian Reservations, and ghost towns. Other places may be known as villages, hamlets, historic districts, townships, boroughs, municipalities, and more.

Each state has a list of all the places in the state and their corresponding county. Each place has a link to a page that includes information about that place. The page may include geographical information, historical information, current information about the place and its surroundings, and much more.

Included also for each state, is a Downloadable PDF with two lists: A list of places and their corresponding county, and; A list of counties with the places that are in that county.
